#### **FEATURE**

Assistant Secretary of Defense for Environment and the Commissioner of Georgia Department of Natural Resources (GADNR), was held on June 4-5, 2019, at the U.S. Army Aviation Center of Excellence at Fort Rucker, Alabama. This meeting included updates on the progress of the SERPPAS Good Map and work group actions based on the 2018 – 2020 Strategic Plan, as well as gave the Principals an opportunity to share their priorities for the coming year. There was also a break out meeting for the Energy Development and Siting work group within SERPPAS. A mobile meeting portion of the agenda gave attendees the chance to see on-the-ground conservation actions on Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ALDCNR) and Alabama Forestry Commission (AFC) lands, as well as Black Hawk helicopter training on a remote training field enabled by the partnership between these state agencies and Fort Rucker. At this meeting, the State Co-Chair, GADNR, passed this role to ALDCNR for the next two year term, and all the Principals expressed their commitment to and appreciation of the SERPPAS partnership to advance their missions in the region. - Accomplishment Report. This report celebrates the achievements associated with ALRI over the past decade based on data and success stories compiled from partners across the longleaf range from southern Virginia to eastern Texas. Since 2010, there have been over 1.2 million acres of longleaf planted, over 10 million acres of prescribed burns and over 200,000 acres of land protected. SERPPAS has been a supporter of the America's Longleaf Restoration Initiative since its inception, and will continue to support it through their focus on prescribed fire and threatened, endangered and at-risk species. - ▶ (USDA) The USDA National Agroforestry Center is requesting proposals to create regionally-applicable and practice-specific agroforestry educational materials based on producer production information, experiences and testimonies. The agreements awarded under this announcement will support the USDA goal to strengthen the stewardship of private lands through technology and research. These materials will also address natural resource professionals' need for more information that supports producer adoption of agroforestry. Proposals must be submitted by July 15, 2019. - ► (NFWF) Partners at the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation assessed coastal resilience in five regions and eight watersheds in the contiguous United States to create a new interactive mapping tool and reports to help understand coastal resilience, the <a href="Coastal Resilience Evaluation and Siting Tool (CREST)">CREST can be used to make informed decisions about the siting of restoration and resilience projects. The tool identifies Resilience Hubs, which are areas of open space where projects may have the greatest potential to benefit both human community resilience and fish and wildlife. Resilience Hubs incorporate multiple indices, which can also be explored through CREST. - ▶ (USDA NRCS) A directive from USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service states that at least 10 percent of the total funds available for conservation programs each year beginning in

- FY2019 through FY2023 are to be used for source water protection. NRCS will track compliance with the requirement to dedicate 10 percent of conservation program funds based on agency investments within identified local priority areas. - ▶ (U.S. Endowment) Nearly 5,500 acres of wetlands, critical pocosin, Carolina bay, bottomland hardwood forests, and Long Bay and Salters Creek water frontage have been acquired by the North Carolina Coastal Land Trust (NCCLT) in partnership with Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point and North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission (NCWRC). The project was made possible thanks to the support of a multiple funding entities, including the Enviva Forest Conservation Fund and is located within the geographical boundary of the Eastern NC Sentinel Landscape. ## • Threatened, Endangered, and At-Risk Species

- ► (ALRI) America's Longleaf Restoration Initiative released the first in what will be a series of informational fact sheets illustrating longleaf pine's resiliency. This first fact sheet focuses on longleaf pine's resistance to insects and diseases including bark beetles, pine regeneration pests, and fungal pests. - ► (FLFWC) Fifteen eastern indigo snakes, listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act, have just been released in northern Florida as part of a continuing collaborative plan to return the important apex predator to the region. This effort marks the third year in a row that snakes raised specifically for recovery of the species have been released at The Nature Conservancy's Apalachicola Bluffs and Ravines Preserve. The eastern indigo species recovery effort in North Florida is the long-term joint commitment of multiple nonprofit, agency, and academic partners including the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, the Nature Conservancy, and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. - ▶ (USFWS) The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will be conducting five-year status reviews of 53 endangered or threatened fish, wildlife, and plants found in the Southeastern United States, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands, among them the threatened gopher tortoise. This process is mandated by the Endangered Species Act to ensure listing classifications under the ESA are accurate and recommend changes in status where appropriate based on the latest science and analysis.
